THE RABBI'S MESSAGE ABOUT SPEECH

We just celebrated Passover with the inspiring Seders, that as much as 95% of our fellow Jews in Israel participate in. The main thrust of the evening is retelling the story of our people's bondage and redemption. The vehicle we use is the Haggadah, which means to retell or speak. Similarly, the literal translation of Pesach, is "mouth speak", and Pharaoh means "evil mouth." Clearly, speech is indisputably of supreme importance on Passover, and actually every day. It is therefore worthwhile to learn more about speech.

Rabbi Yisroel Meir Kagan, known by the book about speech he authored, Chofetz Chaim, delineates 14 positive commandments one can fulfill and 17 negative commandments a person can transgress depending on how he uses his speech. Commentaries on the book of Leviticus, (Vayikra), point out a possible reason the Torah portion regarding punishments for speaking negatively of others immediately follows the portion of non-kosher foods. It is illustrated in Tales of the Tongue by Esther Ehrenreich. Some Chasidim, following their Rebbi's instructions went to visit a certain Jewish inn. Almost immediately they found themselves interrogating the innkeeper before they would even consider eating the meat he offered to serve them. An old man told them, "My dear friends, why are you so cautious about the ritual slaughterers' identity, how many times was the meat rinsed off after it was salted, and wish to know everything about the food that goes into your mouths, yet when it comes to speech, we do not give it a second thought, and do not stop to ask ourselves whether it is permitted or not?" Rebbetzin Esther Jungreis (ob"m) in her book, Torah for Your Table adds, speaking gossip and badly of others is equated to transgressing the three cardinal sins of idolatry, immorality and murder. Unfortunately, the worldwide media glorifies gossip, regardless of how it impacts and even destroys people's lives. She adds, speech is a Divine gift, given only (continued page 5)

to mankind. To abuse that gift is to betray that trust.

What is Loshon Hora, or improper speech, comparable to? A king was once searching for the finest royal chef. When a veteran world class chef prepared dishes, everyone was absolutely smitten by the heavenly aroma that wafted throughout the entire palace and was therefore, stunned when the king refused to even consider that candidate. The king explained, "though I too was enchanted by the aroma, I could never seriously consider his appointment, as the pots and pans the cook was using were absolutely filthy." Similarly, though G-d relishes our prayers, when they are contaminated by a mouth that relates spiritual poisons as gossip, the prayers are unable to reach the heights they otherwise might have.

In biblical times when a person spoke improper speech the Torah describes how he, his clothing and/or house would contract a skin disease known as Tzrara'at, a spiritual ailment, with physical manifestations, not unlike leprosy. As a result, if pronounced "impure" by the priest, the "patient" could sometime be sent out of the Israel camp in the wilderness. This demonstrated the impact of even one word. The book, Parsha Pearls adds, "instead of feeling for his fellow as he feels towards himself, instead of respecting him and saying nice things about him, the sinner spoke negative, bad things, as if he was superior to the person against whom he spoke. He showed pride and haughtiness and separated from the person whom he slandered," (and possibly caused separation between friends or husbands and wives). Since he separated himself from his fellow Jew and caused division between others, he must, measure for measure, be sent away from the Jewish camp. Also, he is pronounced spiritually impure, implying, not only is he distanced from people; he is distanced from G-d as well. Hashem is saying, "If you haughtily place yourself above your fellow Jew and sever your closeness to him, you sever your closeness to me too!"

The book, Tell It From The Torah, explains on the verse Leviticus (14:9), "He shall shave off all his hair-his head, his beard, and his eyebrows, The three places the hair is shaved off, atone for the three reasons he receives tzara'at: Firstly, for haughtiness, feeling he's above the rest, his head is shaven. Secondly, for slander, as he uses his mouth to speak evil, the hair around his mouth is shaven. Thirdly, is the person's stinginess and inability to see any good in people. Therefore, his eyebrows are shaven. The Midrash Tanchuma says that bad speech hurts three people, the person spoken about by killing his reputation and the speaker and listener by evoking heavenly judgment upon

themselves. On the verse, "He will sit alone outside the camp" (Leviticus 13:46) some explain, a person with tzara'at is like someone who is dead, because he's on his own, away from all others, while craving companionship.

When someone mentions the attack of 9 11, everyone thinks about the cataclysmic and far reaching results. However, even on a micro view, there are significant and far reaching consequences as well in our everyday lives. In Purity of Speech the author tells of a girl who had just celebrated her engagement only to have the groom break it the very next morning. The mother in particular was inconsolable, and obsessed with finding the "culprit." She was beyond shocked when it finally came out years later that the groom overheard her innocently remark, "I hope he (the groom) can handle my daughter." Reflect on how one careless, flippant remark, by a loved one, no less, could have devastating consequences, preventing a union and generations that otherwise would have been born.

We commemorate during 33 of the 49 days between Passover and Shevuos the passing of 24,000 disciples of Rabbi Akiva, who died, "because they did not extend adequate honor to one another." Along the same lines, in the Torah, there are two birds used in the purification process. One, because of improper speech, the second, the Zohar explains, is to atone for withholding positive and encouraging speech when we are able. "The person who fails to express appreciation to a spouse, who has shown selflessness or devotion, will evoke an air of latent hostility in the home. Similarly, a parent or teacher who does not recognize the special efforts of a child or student will do damage equal to if not greater than those who indulge in the evil tongue." And what is meant by the expression that the students did not provide "adequate" honor? For example as Rabbi Frand explains, we see someone putting in extra special efforts on behalf of the community. Our compliments or heartfelt thanks are all it takes to make him want to continue his efforts. But most of us do not even notice his efforts, and if we do, we smugly decide that he must have some ulterior motives for investing those efforts. Sometime it is because of envy or jealousy.

Daily, as we come closer to the anniversary of receiving our holy Torah at Mount Sinai, may we come closer to one another and our Creator, by curtailing bad speech, while steadily increasing our positive and encouraging speech. By thereby replicating the unity at the encampment just prior to the Divine Revelation at Mount Sinai, may each of us continue to grow in character

development and spirituality and thereby merit receiving our portion of the holy Torah anew. Amen.

BECOME A SPONSOR

Celebrating a special occasion, such as a significant birthday or anniversary, or a birth, wedding or graduation in the family? Or observing a yahrzeit? Or just want to honor a special person or event? Why not share it with the congregation by sponsoring a **Shalosh Seudos or mini-Kiddush**?

The **Shalosh Seudos** (third meal) is a light meal held every Shabbos afternoon between the mincha (afternoon) and maariv (evening) services. The menu can be customized but usually consists of sliced gefilte fish, tuna fish or egg salad, other light foods, fresh fruit, cookies or pastries, challah and crackers, and soda. The cost of sponsoring is approximately \$50 depending on the final menu. \$10 of this amount is a donation to the VCJC.

The **mini-Kiddush** is held every Shabbos morning in the Boyarsky Hall immediately following services. It consists of wine and grape juice for reciting the Kiddush, accompanied by a variety of pareve pastries and cookies. The cost to sponsor is a more modest \$25.

A **third option** is sponsoring one of the monthly lectures held between January and June. Preceding each lecture, we serve a light breakfast of bagels, cream cheese and lox along with coffee. Sponsorship costs \$100.

If you wish to be a **sponsor** for any of these events, simply contact the office to book the date, preferably at least two weeks in advance. The office staff will take care of making all the arrangements. We look forward to your participation in these programs.
